ABOUT

The SALTED Collection is a series of images exploring aspects of age and ageing: the reflection which comes with age and a growing awareness that all things end. All items photographed were found on Whitstable Beach in January 2023: I actively looked for the broken, the faded and the ignored.

The shells, seaweed, driftwood and rusted objects are shown exactly as they were found (albeit with some of the sand blown off) - there are no digital effects involved - but each item is nevertheless elevated into a sculptural and slightly surreal object that seems to have a personality and an authentic, personal story to tell (as we all do). I hope those stories gives you food for thought.

I only print on the finest, fine art paper to the highest archival standards - these prints will last, unfaded, for decades, even centuries if cared for. Each print has a glorious texture and quality to it which time will not fade. I title each image at the end of the process.

Common Whelk shell and Driftwood. For native Americans, the whelk is a symbol of strength and endurance. Driftwood/Flotsam offers sanctuary to breeding insects and invertebrates and can also be a reference to people lost in life's storms, seeking safety, peace and tenderness.

The title is a line from 'Let It Be', by Paul McCartney but credited to Lennon-McCartney.

(Broken) Whelk Shell and Pebble. The most beautiful part of a whelk shell - the hidden, middle spiral, is only visible when the shell is broken.

There are over 1 million people living with dementia in the UK. Dancing, sometimes, can reach through.

Cockle shell. There is a theory that you can tell the age of a cockle by the growth rings on the shell, in the same way that you can age a tree.

The title is a reference to "Warning", a poem by Jenny Joseph. The ambiguity of the image works against the rhythm of the poem.

Scallop shell. The scallop shell is used as a symbol by pilgrims to recognize themselves and is also used on signs on the Camino, indicating the Way of Saint James.

The title is a reference to the final stage in the grieving process, which is a form of pilgrimage.

Eroded stone. Small enough to sit in your palm and showing obvious signs of a tough life, so far.

The title is on obvious reference to Dylan Thomas, 'Do not go gentle into that good night', the final line of which is 'Rage, rage against the dying of the light'.

Spiral wrack (seaweed). In Japanese folklore, a shōjō is a nature spirit with streaming red hair and a seaweed girdle.

The title is taken from the final couplet of Shakespeare's 30th sonnet: But if the while I think on thee, dear friend, All losses are restor'd and sorrows end.

All prints are on supplied mounted in black. archival standard mounts. When purchased at an art market or fair, the mounts will be edged in 6mm pine, sprayed with gold leaf paint.
